

SEARCH Coordinators

Community-based coordinators facilitate the process

- Identify potential site and begin the SEARCH mentor application process.
- Foster or initiate student-mentor match.
- Facilitate access to student housing.
- Facilitate student travel processes.
- Orient student/residents to the community and to community-specific cultural competency experiences to anticipate.
- Visit training site during student/resident rotation to assess site, student, preceptor, interdisciplinary team, and community progress and challenges.

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Academic SEARCH Partners

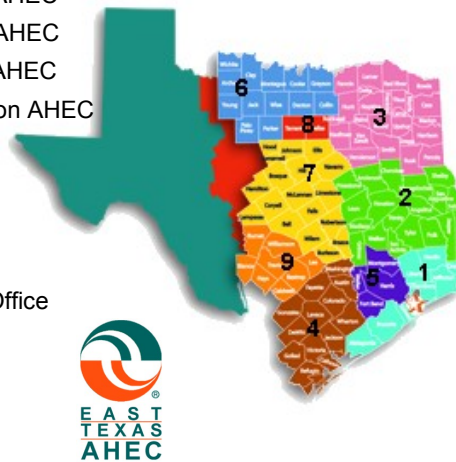

Community experiences

- Increase student/resident understanding of community and public health issues that impact the delivery of health care to the underserved populations
- Develop/facilitate culturally appropriate community health interventions
- Recognize the potential of recruiting the health professions learner as your communities' future health care provider

Networking

- Discover how interdisciplinary and statewide partnerships enhance the physician's practice
- Share and coordinate resources
- Develop new strategies for providing primary care services for medically underserved populations

Clinical Experiences

Eligible Training Site Participants

Clinical training sites from among the Texas federally designated and other underserved clinical services sites, *i.e.* CHC, FQHC, NHSC, Migrant Health Center, Rural Health Center, County Health District ,

- who use an interprofessional team approach to patient care and
- whose mentor/preceptor is willing to
 - discuss career options and opportunities with the learner
 - engage learner in community activities
 - foster student/resident service-learning experiences (*community assessment, research on a specific community health problem, etc.*) that result in service to the community and increase learner's skills and commitment to serve the underserved
 - facilitate learner experience in administrative aspects of the facility and practice management (*i.e. critical-skills development, leadership development, healthcare delivery effectiveness, health disparities collaborative strategies*)

Benefits to training site

- Faculty development program for designated site preceptors
- Modest monetary allowance for each student/resident placement for educational activity support
- Pipeline of health care professionals for potential community employment

Participation Objectives

Sustained each year

- 30 underserved training sites engaged
- 30 community faculty
